Orange Button Community Scheme

People who are having thoughts of suicide, or who are worried about a friend or family member, can now push the button when they see someone wearing a distinctive orange badge, and ask them for information and support. The orange button is worn by people in Lancashire and South Cumbria who have undergone specialised suicide prevention training, and while they are not able to counsel people, they can provide comprehensive signposting to relevant services. There is also an orange button sticker that can be supplied to businesses and organisations such as cafes, shops and pubs, to place in a prominent window alerting people to trained staff available to help.

ICON WEEK UPDATE

Last week, partners from across Blackpool, Blackburn with Darwen and Lancashire joined together to share an important health message. Footballers from Preston North End, Burnley F.C. and Blackburn Rovers also got involved to record a message to help reach more male care givers.

Using the ICON message and resources, we want to empower parents and carers with babies – helping them to understand that babies cry, they can cope, and to reduce the risk of abusive head trauma, previously known as 'Shaken Baby Syndrome'. Abusive Head Trauma (AHT) also known as 'shaken baby syndrome' can cause catastrophic brain injuries, which can lead to death, or significant long-term health and learning disabilities.
